

21st Annual Conference of the International Environmetrics Society (TIES 2010)

Margarita Island, Hesperia Isla de Margarita, Venezuela, 20-25 June, 2010

Funding from the World Bank for Participants from Developing Countries

The next Annual Conference of The International Environmetrics Society (TIES 2010) will be held in Margarita Island, Venezuela during June 20-25, 2010. See <http://www.cesma.usb.ve/ties2010/> for details. TIES 2010 is the annual conference of the International Environmetrics Society (TIES), an international association that operates under the umbrella of the International Statistical Institute (ISI).

The World Bank has provided funds through the ISI to provide partial support for a limited number of participants from developing countries for TIES 2010. The support will cover registration fees. In selected cases funding will also provide partial support for travel and hotel expenses. This additional amount will vary depending on the number of applicants and their needs. We plan to support the participation of at least 15 persons with these funds.

Eligibility Criteria:

You will need to comply with the following requirements:

- a) You need to be a member of TIES; if you are not currently a member, you can join the society when you register in the conference. See <http://www.cesma.usb.ve/ties2010/registrationFees.html> for information on how to become a member.
- b) You must be a citizen and full-time resident of a developing country according to the World Bank list of developing countries (see below).
- c) You need to present an invited or contributed paper. You should submit your abstract through the website at: http://www.cesma.usb.ve/ties2010/call_for_abstracts.html

The deadline for submission is March 19, 2010.

Application Process for Funding:

Please send a copy of your CV, proof of citizenship and residency in a developing country, abstract of your talk, and a one-page cover letter (that includes rationale for the funding request, the amount of funding requested, and how you will cover the remaining costs to participate in the conference). The goal of the grant from World Bank is capacity building in developing countries, so your cover letter should indicate clearly how your participation in TIES 2010 will contribute to this goal.

The application should be submitted via e-mail to Dr. Lelys Guenni, Chair of TIES 2010 at ties2010@cesma.usb.ve. **The application must be received by March 19, 2010.**

Successful applicants will be notified by April 30, 2010.
